Some years ago I presided at a wedding after which the couple gave guests small, flat rectangular boxes in which when opened to greet the newlyweds would then release monarch butterflies. As the couple emerged from the church, on the count of 3, we all opened our boxes, removing the lid from the bottom, and with a bit of an encouraging toss, hoped our butterfly would emerge and join the mass of other colorful wings to fly away in happiness. It was an interesting exercise in hope and tinged with some disappointment. Some of the butterflies had "expired" in transit. So, when the boxes opened a few of the butterflies fell to the ground rather than taking wings skyward. But I was fascinated by the image of how we live in hope and faith evident in those butterflies.

Our congregation is experiencing a similar journey. We've prepared for partnership, have created and affirmatively passed documents which will guide our Williams County ELCA Parish ministry, and soon we will be formally in that arrangement. Will we take wing and fly or will we have an alternate, and less hopeful outcome? I'm counting on the first - and am leaning into the grace of God, prayerfully anticipating those encouraging boosts from members of all 3 congregations. That doesn't imply that I am unrealistically aware of the times that some plans, projects, programs might result in discouragement. It does claim that this undertaking is not fully of human minds and hands, hearts and hopes. God is in the mix, nurturing and enabling this venture in God's timing.

In the meantime we prepare together. A few adjustments have already occurred in our Sunday morning worship and a couple more will come by the end of August. If you have feedback to share as we move forward, please speak to me or seek out one of Trinity's members appointed by council to the Joint Parish Board: Karen Gallagher, Doug Johnson or Martha Eickhoff.

My guiding scripture verse for the next 2 months is, "So, if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" 2 Corinthians 5:17, and I am suggesting it for our parish life together as a memory verse.

## Worship Focus for July

June 30 & July 1 Sixth Weekend after Pentecost

A woman finds healing by touching Jesus' cloak, and a girl is restored to life when he takes her by the hand. In both cases a boundary is crossed: in Jesus' time the hemorrhaging woman was considered ritually unclean, polluting others by her touch, and anyone who touched a corpse also became unclean. In Mark's gospel Jesus breaks down barriers, from his first meal at a tax collector's house to his last breath on the cross as the temple curtain is torn in two. We dare to touch Jesus in our "uncleaness" and to live as a community that defines no one as an outsider.

July 7 & 8 Seventh Weekend after Pentecost

Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the between: between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent.

July 14 & 15 Eighth Weekend after Pentecost

When Amos told what he saw when God held up the plumb line of justice next to Israel—that the poor were being trampled—he was a threat to the power of priests and king. John the Baptist also spoke truth to power, and Herod had him beheaded. In Herod's fear that Jesus is John returned from the dead, we may hear hope for the oppressed: that all the prophets killed through the ages are alive in Jesus. We are called to witness to justice in company with them.

July 21 & 22 Ninth Weekend after Pentecost

Mark's gospel makes clear how great was the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves. Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. We are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves.

July 28 & 29 Tenth Weekend after Pentecost

Today is the first of five Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the slightest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.

## WORSHIP FOCUS FOR AUGUST

**August 4 & 5** Eleventh Weekend after Pentecost  
Apparently not satisfied by Jesus' feeding of thousands, some who were there press him for a sign of his power; perhaps it is daily manna they want. As always in John's gospel when people want a sign, Jesus offers himself. He is the bread come from heaven to give life to the world. He calls us to come to him and believe in him, and through that relationship to know the one who sent him.

**August 12 & 13** Twelfth Weekend after Pentecost  
Jesus says that the bread he gives for the life of the world is his flesh, and whoever eats this bread has eternal life now and will be raised on the last day. In Ephesians Paul tells us what this life Jesus gives us looks like, this life we live as those marked with the seal of the Holy Spirit in baptism. We live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us. The whole purpose of life is giving yourself for the other.

**August 19 & 20** Thirteenth Weekend after Pentecost  
Wisdom prepares a feast, sets her table, and invites all to come and eat her bread and drink her wine. The first chapter of John's gospel owes much to the biblical tradition that imagined Wisdom as existing before anything was created and having a role in the work of creation. Christ, the wisdom of God (1 Cor. 1:24), today invites us to eat his flesh and drink his blood. John's gospel includes no account of the institution of the Lord's supper, but here we can't help hearing Jesus' words as an invitation to the meal of bread and wine we share.

**August 26 & 27** Fourteenth Weekend after Pentecost  
In today's gospel many people take offense at Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh and drink his blood; even many of Jesus' disciples peel off. This is the backdrop in John's gospel for Peter's confession of faith. "To whom can we go?" asks Peter, in words we sometimes sing just before the gospel is read. "You have the words of eternal life." In order to take such a stand, as Peter and Joshua did, Paul tells us to arm ourselves with the word of God. We pray in the Spirit that we might be bold ambassadors of the gospel.

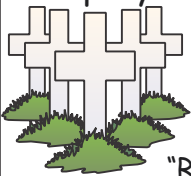

# Sweet Success for the 36<sup>th</sup> Annual Strawberry Festival



June 13, 2018 and the weeks leading up to that date found at least 50 members of Trinity busy at work in preparation and joyfully serving at the 36<sup>th</sup> Annual Strawberry Festival. Planning was done, recipes were chosen, a menu was decided, groceries were purchased, shortcakes were baked, pie dough was made, rolled into crusts and baked, strawberries were cleaned, cut and made into tasty filling, all kinds of hot food was prepared, potato salad was made, tables were arranged, publicity was shared, tasks were determined and crews assigned to fill those tasks, funds were donated, tents were erected on the church lawn, and everything was cleaned up so the entire crew was home with feet up by 7:30 p.m. the evening of the event - WHEW!

Makes us contentedly tired to review the list of everything we accomplished together. And quite an accomplishment it was. With the disbanding of Trinity WELCA at the end of 2017, a few folks stepped forward and desired to continue the Strawberry Festival as a congregational project. That resulted in some new faces taking on new responsibilities, and being willing to take on some of the resulting joys and challenges. Nevertheless, here's the sweet story of success.

We fed approximately 450 people either dining in or driving thru. We baked and sold as whole pies or served them in pieces; we used nearly 5 dozen shortcakes and 35 small dishes of ice cream topped with berries; 3 roasters of Creamed Chicken Sandwiches, 2 roasters of Sloppy Joes, 80 hot dogs, 3 roasters of Baked Beans, 100 pounds of potatoes in potato salad, and several cases of water were consumed. We received \$5656.92 in various forms, including free will donations, financial gifts, seed money from WELCA, and Thrivent Action Team cards. Expenses were \$1979.66, and that includes pie plates to last the next couple of years, and some other disposable items which were purchased in bulk. Profit is \$3680.26. Nearly \$1600 has been set aside for 2019. In honor of the WELCA's long term commitment to empowering women and their generous sharing of seed funds, \$250 each was sent to Sarah's Friends and Power in the Purse. Benefactors of the remaining proceeds have yet to be determined.
